New Medical Complex Grand Opening

The building project is a major estate development for both the University and the Faculty of Medicine, with a budget of HK\$1,568 million. The foundation works began in 1998 and the superstructure construction started in July 1999. The University Grants Committee allocated HK\$1,128 million to fund the pre-clinical complex while The Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust donated HK\$270 million for the construction of the 7,200 square metre Clinical Research Centre.

AIDS Institute at HKU

Dr David Ho Tai-yi 何大一, Director of the Aaron Diamond Aids Research Center (ADARC), an affiliate of the Rockefeller University of New York, has signed an agreement with HKU to establish an AIDS Institute at the New Medical Complex.

Under Dr Ho's guidance, the Institute, equipped with stateof-the-art research facilities, will conduct basic research on HIV, create and design new therapies for the infection, and develop AIDS vaccines.

Dr Ho said, "It is part of a larger effort to do something that will help to gain control of this problem, particularly in China, where the epidemic is getting worse."

In many Asian countries, particularly China, there is a rapidly increasing number of HIV infections. According to Chinese government officials, there are around 850,000 people infected

with HIV. During the first half of 2001, the number of infections reported rose by 67% when compared with the same period in 2000. If measures are not taken to stop the spread of HIV, the current epidemic in China could reach 10 million by the end of the decade according to a United Nations report released in July 2002.
